

## CrimeReports<sup>TM</sup> Website—Set up your own Crime Alert

If you are interested to track crime activity in the Cougar Gulch area and have internet access, there is and informative website, *CrimeReports*<sup>TM</sup>.

Here, users can get local crime information that is sponsored by the Kootenai County Sherriff's department. Visit: <a href="https://www.crimereports.com">www.crimereports.com</a> and enter a location.

Users can also create a Crime Alert Report that can be sent to you electronically on a daily, weekly, or monthly basis. These crime reports allow you to choose the type of crimes you are interested in by customizing them to your interests. The report lists the type of crimes for the time period chosen and lists the number of incidences in the categories you select at the loca-



tion you specified. You can view a local map showing the parameters you have set and see where the crimes occurred.

The map portion of a crime alert report shows the actual locations of incidents based on the parameters you set. The information is a good way to stay informed and up to date with crime activity in our neighborhoods. Take a look! Be informed!

## **Worley Highway District Notes**

The folks at the Worley Highway District are well into a summer maintenance schedule. Gravel roads have been graded and re-graded and new gravel has been spread on many of our roads. Magnesium-Chloride applications throughout the district has also been completed. Centerline stripes have been repainted, and resurfacing of paved roads is occurring in the southern part of the district. We keep to a six or seven year interval for repaving roads by spending one month each summer repaving (chip sealing) roads that require the application.

Roads in the Cougar Gulch and Meadowbrook areas are scheduled for repaving in 2015 and 2016; however, some patching was done this year on rough sections. It's a big job and requires a lot of equipment, planning, and personnel. The four highway districts in the county share resources in order to accomplish this work in an expeditious manner.



New culverts were installed under Cougar Gulch and Heine roads, and a bad curve on Thompson Road was improved. Additionally, some of our employees attended classes on traffic sign reflectivity, speed zones and maintenance. ## **Coeur d'Alene History**

Paleo-Indian tribes first settled the region around Coeur d'Alene some 10,000 years ago, but the first European settlers didn't actually arrive until much later.



This area was part of the Louisiana Purchase called "New France", and was quite remote at the time. Trappers ventured into the area during the 18th century, and French-speaking fur traders named Coeur d'Alene Lake and established trade with the local, indigenous population.

Coeur d'Alene means "heart of an awl", and in 1878 the US military built Fort Sherman, and the small settlement expanded quickly.

The town was incorporated in 1887 and was a center of mining, logging, fur trading and also saw the beginning of the tourist trade with lake steamers and summer cottages. The timber boom of the early 20<sup>th</sup> century caused a population growth. Since that time it has been transformed into a year round tourist destination with festivals, concerts and plenty to do in all seasons.

## **Cougar Gulch Neighbor Spotlight**

This is a new section that we hope to feature going forward in each issue. The

purpose of the spotlight is to help us learn more about the interesting people that live in the Gulch. Our first spotlight falls on Judi Horton!

Nestled on a guiet stretch of Meadowbrook Loop is the quaint, picturesque home of Tom Bacon and Judi Horton. Out front, next to the road, hangs a charming sign touting fresh baked bread every Saturday. Judi Horton is the force behind Judi's Pantry, as the home business is called, and she provides fresh breads, jams and gift baskets on Saturdays and by special order. Tom & Judi have lived in North Idaho for 17 years, 7 of those in their current location. Originally from the Dallas and Houston areas, Judi practiced law and Tom was an award winning newscaster for an ABC radio affiliate. But as time moved on, they felt ready for a change that just happened to coincide with the graduation of the youngest child from high school.

The natural beauty of North Idaho was one of the driving forces that brought

them to the Northwest. That, and as Judi puts it, "Coeur d'Alene seemed to have the most to offer for what we were looking for, and when I requested information on the area, the city did the best job of enticing us". She went on to say that they were most interested in finding quality, small-city living that offered seasons, mountains, and pristine areas. They found their little piece of heaven in the Cougar Gulch area.

Judi has been baking bread since 1969. Back then she lived in Puerto Rico and could not get the type of bread that was common in the US. Hungry for a taste of home, she learned to bake it herself, and just never stopped. In 2012, looking for a creative outlet to share with her family, her neighbors, and her church, Judi's Pantry was born. "I thought about it for a long time – perennial trepidation I guess—and decided it was a great way to meet neighbors" says Judi. A visit to her home is a thoroughly enchanting experience. Judi incorporates many items into her products from her large, lovely garden, and bakes all of her breads and rolls right in her very busy, cozy kitchen. Her home is located at 6863 W. Meadowbrook Loop.

Judi's Pantry typically offers three items each week. A weekly assortment can include a sweet breakfast roll or coffee cake, a slicing toast or sandwich loaf, and a dinner bread such as rolls or a round, mounded loaf. Judi emails

friends & neighbors on her email list every Wednesday with what's in the oven for that week, and takes orders, if customers would like something held for them through Friday. That helps her know how much to prepare and bake. Her favorite breads to create are the braided ones because she says "they're fun to make, and a bit unusual." She makes three scrumptious braids – garden herb, mashed potato and orange zest/cinnamon twist - YUM! When asked what she wanted people to know most about her products she said "They're honest. Home tested recipes, plain and fresh ingredients, and hand formed. I'm proud to put it on our table." Judi provides a personal touch and her products are made with love and attention to detail. 

#### **Update—Unified Land Use Code Information for Kootenai County**

This is a follow-up article from the May-June KITTEN. In that edition we wrote about the County's efforts to develop new land-use regulations for all unincorporated areas of Kootenai County. Readers can review information and land use code updates at:

<u>www.kccode.com</u>. This site provides information to the process being undertaken and a variety of key documents about the code that you can review.



Part of the code's purpose reads as follows:

- Establish zoning districts within Kootenai County in accord with the adopted Comprehensive Plan.
- Provide standards for the orderly growth and development of Kootenai County and to avoid undue concentration of population and overcrowding of land.
- Carry out the policies of the Comprehensive Plan

by classifying and regulating the uses of property and structures within the unincorporated areas of Kootenai County;

• Establish zoning districts within Kootenai County in accord with the adopted Comprehensive Plan.

The planning commission public hearings scheduled for June have been postponed. Information on what to expect next can be found on the website. A copy of the comprehensive plan can also be accessed from this site under Key Documents.

The website group was established in June, 2012 to help provide a collective voice for rural, unincorporated property owners.
